Usher Tips & Hints

COLD AND 'FLU SEASON WILL SOON BE HERE. INFLUENZA VACCINES ARE AVAILABLE NOW.

Stay at least 6 feet away from a sick person to avoid coming into contact with their germs. A 'cold' is contagious for up to 3 days; 'flu for 5-7 days. If you are not feeling well, look after yourself - stay home, stay warm, stay hydrated, and don't spread the bugs to us!

family being from Scotland, Czechoslovakia and Greece. She was born in Washington, DC where she lived for her first 10 years. She was a resident of Silver Spring, MD (3 miles from her DC home) for the next 23 years. In her youth, she spent entire summers in upstate New York on her grandparents' 200-acre farm, "roughing it" with no indoor plumbing, no running water, an outhouse and a wood stove. Among other things she learned on the farm was how to milk cows and gather chicken eggs, far from the city life of her school friends.

Looking back, growing up in the DC area where political news is also local news, she grew up with a different perspective from people living far away from the capital. She feels that sometimes that is a good thing, sometimes a bad thing yet she loved being part of the national current events and in a family proud to be Americans.

Laura married an Air Force man. They moved 4 times: North Carolina, Arizona, England and then back to Arizona where Laura has made her home for the last 32 years. Most of Laura's working life she was an accountant for large computer companies. After a divorce, she worked for the Mesa Police Department as a dispatcher and then as a civilian officer.
